SCHOOL PLAYING FIELDS.—The new soccer pitch was given a fitting christening when Councillor Ivor Morgan, president of the Old Boys, kicked off in the match between the School 1st XI and the Old Boys XI.

We shall, this year, for the first time, be able to play home cricket matches on our own ground.

THE PREFECTS' ROOM.—Due to certain unforeseen structural faults, the Upper VIth form-room has been abandoned for teaching purposes, and so the prefects now have a refuge where they may forget their cares and have a chat with their fellow prefects. The Library was adapted to form an extra classroom.

INTER-SCHOOL DEBATING SOCIETY.—This Society has enjoyed its most successful year so far. Two debates and two talks were held.

Dr. Thomas gave a most interesting and instructive lecture on life in 16th and 17th Century Swansea. The second talk was by Miss Roisin Guinan, who, with the aid of slides, related her impressions of Russia, gained during her visit there last summer.

The motions debated by the Society were "Overspecialisation in the Sixth Form" and "Modern Society has completely lost its sense of values."

SCHOOL TRIPS.—Parties from the school have been to see three films this year, namely: "The Ten Commandments," "The Doctors' Dilemma" and "Julius Caesar."

The Fifth and Sixth Forms attended a performance, in the Girls' School, of "Richard of Bordeaux," while several boys went to see the Gilbert and Sullivan opera "Ruddigore" at Christ College. Also, during the year, a number of Fifth Formers saw a production of Shakespeare's "Othello" at Aberdare and members of the Junior and Middle School saw the play "A Servant of Two Masters," in Brecon.

On July 8th a party of thirty Sixth formers paid a visit to the Houses of Parliament where Mr. Tudor Watkins, M.P., and Mr. Idwal Jones, M.P., kindly showed them around. Before leaving, Robert Leonard,

on behalf of the party, presented a School Plaque to Mr. Watkins. The boys then toured London under the guidance of Mr. Angell and Mr. Harvey Williams.

The Geography VIth attended a Geomorphology Course at the Girls' School during the last week of the Easter Term and, earlier in the year, visited Aberystwyth on a Geography excursion. A party of boys also visited Llandarcy oil-refinery, most of the Lower VIth form attended the Judge's Service in Brecon; boys from the Third, Fourth and Sixth forms went to the Commonwealth Exhibition in Cardiff, and rugger enthusiasts saw their fellow-countrymen beaten by the French Secondary Schools at Cardiff.

MR. GROVES.—The whole School will, I am sure, join in congratulating Mr. Groves on a double triumph, the birth of a baby son and his election as Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society.

HOCKEY MATCH.—In the first inter-school hockey match the brawn of the boys succeeded in beating the brains of the girls to the tune of three goals to nil.

PRIZE DAY, 1960.

Wednesday, 6th April, heralded the coming, once again, of the School Prize Day. This was the second Prize Day held in the new school and it proved just as successful as in previous years. Professor C. E. Gittins, Dean of the Faculty of Education at University College, Swansea was the Guest Speaker and Mrs. Gittins presented the prizes.

Much of interest and importance both to pupils and parents was contained in Professor Gittins' speech. He spoke first of the part the parents could play in helping with the education of their children. He said that parents could help by giving the child every chance to work at home, also by being careful both in what they read and by being careful in speech and in what literature they allowed into the house.

To the pupils Professor Gittins offered this advice—"Life is exciting, there are vast treasures in it, and it is important that you should select." Continuing on the theme of "selecting" carefully, Professor Gittins used as an example, some of the great lives, all of which, if one

looks closely, are lives brimful of specialisation. Prof. Gittins added that this selecting did not only apply in early life, but also in later life, when one had to be equally careful in choosing the correct way.

The Headmaster's report encompassed nearly all school activities. Mr. Rees, in his report, also made mention of the part parents could play in helping to educate their children. He criticised those children who leave school early, adding that these boys leave school at the most vital point of their careers, usually in the fourth form, for they were just beginning to develop both mentally and physically.

The Headmaster spoke next of the W.J.E.C. examinations. Eighty boys were entered but the picture was not wholly satisfactory. The standard obtained at Advanced Level was satisfactory—fifteen boys were entered; twelve obtained certificates, while two obtained subject distinctions. Seven boys were now at University College, two would be proceeding to Training Colleges in September and three were still at School.

The standard achieved at Ordinary Level was not, however, very satisfactory. After both the June and November examination twenty had obtained passes in five or more subjects. This compared unfavourably with thirty-five in 1958.

A vote of thanks was proposed by Professor D. J. Davies and

seconded by the Head Boy, David Powell.

T. S. ELIOT'S "MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL."

An outstanding event of the school year was the performance of "Murder in the Cathedral" by the pupils of the Boys' School with the aid of the pupils of the Girls' School. The play was performed before the public on 20th January, and met with considerable success. A modest profit was realised and the money donated to the World Refugee Year Fund. The play was so successful and so well received that it is hoped it will establish a precedent for further dramatic productions in the school and establish for it a tradition of drama.

The opening night, however, was soon over, the fruits of months of work being gathered in one evening. The great success of the play was due largely to the hard work of Mr. Aneurin Williams, the general readiness of the staff to help and the team work of everyone concerned from the producer to the callboy. Mr. A. Williams cast the play three months before the actual performance and rehearsals were begun at the rate of one or two a week. As the performance drew nearer practices were increased to 3 or 4 a week, and Mr. G. Davies took the performers from the Girls' School under his wing and produced a chorus worthy of any play.

Behind the scenes work was going on continually. Miss Richards took competent control over the costumes of the cast, Mr. Moses (with Mr. Evans) made the props.; Mr. Giles and Mr. Morgan fixed up the lighting for the play, and Mr. Dewi Davies, M. Gittins, G. Curtis, J. Sullivan and B. Jones put the stage up, Mr. Davies acting as Stage Manager. Make-up was supervised by Mr. S. Foulkes, Mr. P. Evans, Mr. C. Elliot, Mrs. G. Davies and Mrs. A. Williams. Mr. P. Rowlands, was the prompter.

A part of the Cathedral Choir provided the background music for parts of the play and Mr. Butler, the verger, helped greatly by showing everyone around the Cathedral.

Our thanks are extended to the Dean and Chapter of Brecon Cathedral for kindly allowing the school to use the Cathedral for the play. This gave untold help to the cast and stagehands as it provided the atmosphere and background without the use of extensive properties, although some were made.

Also, thanks are to be extended to the Canteen staff for preparing tea for the cast on every practice night.

TURMOTS and ZOIDUR.

Down in Turmotland, we grow turmots. We plant them in the antianhydrous zoider-di-oxide soil. When zoideriferous fartilizers is added, the soil becomes Hydroxide Sulphate solution and Peroxide Carbonate Nitrite.

2AZrD + Zf = HSs + PCNi.

Therefore, if the diagonals — the area + the logarinths = the angle of the hypotenuse of the left angle of the turmots.

i.e. They are one the same base. Q.E.D.

Therefore the equilibrium + the isotherm + the artificial zoidure = hic, haec, hoc + the intestine of the turmot.

 $H_3+I_n=E_q+I_s+A_z$.

Now, if we put a turmot in a bucket of water here are the results. The water is sucked up past the intestines into the larynx past the upper ventricle via an artery into the leaves. From here it is all excreted via the left compound return ventricle back into the bucket as a yellow solution of Turmotate Sulphate.

Now when turmots is heated in a conical flask, turmotic gas + hydroturmot gas is given off. This is collected in a test tube over Concentrated Nitrogen Turmotate as the gas is very insoluble.

When a turmot is eaten, in the special meal that is eaten (e.g. turmot casserole with chipped turmots and boiled zoider) the mixture passes down the right exploratory gland into the hypotenuse of the lung with an isotherm cutting into it.

If the intestines of a turmot be tooked out and examined they be a mixture of the differential calculus of the present adverbial clause of a printing press in turmotic acid. When this is heated, a colourless gas is given off in the form of Turmotic Peroxide in water.

Dc+PAC+P2+Tic=TicPS+W.

If the formulae is taken and the differential calculus defined under water, a past participial passive solution of Nitrogen Turmotide is given off. If this is added to boiled dried turmot leaves, an isohyet on a longitudinal line drawn from the equilibrum of the hypotenusal clause is prepared in the laboratory in diffused night-light under custard and zoidur.

When a turmot sucks up the zoidur from the soil it is taken to the food-store near the intestines and adverbial acid is added. Here it is chemically decomposed into the scientific productivities needed in the parts of the turmot. In other words it is digested.

The greatest danger to a turmot is one of the rarest insects in the world—it is a worm. This queer thing lives in the soil. It eats its way into the turmot near the left ventricular intestines and there it excretes a queer liquid which rots the turmot. This is the differential calculus of turmotic peroxide to the power of 6+Hydroturmot acid

which, if added to Turmotic Peroxide, forms a present passive adverbial isotherm on the same base of the logarinth. If we boil the above, a horrible ponging smell can be heard which if added to Turmotic Nitrate clauses forms the differential calculus and the power of 2 on the same isohyet + water and you are left with zoiduric compounds. If this is lit it artificially decomposes into Turmot gas and water and zoidur di-oxide when added to hic, haec, hoc = the same base of the isobar between the same parallels and leaves the present participle pluperfect + the present tense of avoir or être and past tense of Nitrogen Turmotide which when burned in air decomposes into Turmotate Nitrate + Hydrogen Turmotide.

Finally one is left with the products of the destructive distillation of

turmots and a nasty mess.

DURING the Summer, last year, a party of boys from the School spent a most enjoyable week in Paris, under the care of Dr. W. S. K. Thomas. The party of boys was supplemented by Dr. Thomas's wife and three members of the School Staff.

At 9-10 p.m. on 20th July, a bus pulled out of the Bulwark, Brecon, carrying the majority of the party, the remainder being picked up en route to Newport Station. They arrived at St. Lazare Station, Paris, at 6-10 p.m. next day, after crossing the Channel via Newhaven and Dieppe. A reserved bus took the party across Paris to "L'Institution Bel Air" where they were staying. After having "le diner," the first taste of French food for some, the majority took a leisurely walk around Clamart, the District of Paris where "L'Institution Bel Air"

(a boys' Private School during term time) was situated.

The morning of the first day (Wednesday) was spent at the celebrated Palace of the French Court at Versailles, just outside Paris, and incidentally very near Clamart. Les Trianons (royal lodges adjoining the famous Versailles Palace) were also visited. This morning's tour will undoubtedly prove to have been a memorable experience for the whole party. On returning to Clamart, the spare time after lunch was spent in the writing of postcards. The afternoon proved most enlightening in a coach tour of the Capital visiting most of the famous sites-the Arc de Triomphe, the Champs Elysees, the Louvre, Notre Dame, the Eiffel Tower, The evening was spent at leisure in Clamart.

During the following morning the Party made a more leisurely tour of Notre Dame Cathedral. It certainly lived up to the previously conceived views of the party, as an edifice of world standing in its architecture, craftsmanship and the sanctity of its interior. Les Invalides was visited in the afternoon. This, again, is a most magnificent building, and only by seeing it for oneself can one appreciate it. Inside the massive structure Napoleon's body lies in a huge sarcophagus. A vast military museum is attached to Les Invalides

and this was also visited.

On Friday the party went to the Chateau de Fontainebleau. A packed lunch was eaten in the beautiful Forest of Fontainebleau after the magnificent palace had been toured. As many of the boys had intended to go swimming in the afternoon, the driver of the coach stopped at a swimming pool, which looked particularly enticing. However, the financial resources of the boys made them unable to afford that pool, and so they took their swim, with numerous French boys and girls, in the River Seine, nearby.

It would be appropriate to say here that most evenings were set aside for leisure, and that most boys spent their time in Clamart, while occasionally some ventured into the City centre, on the Metro, the

nearest station being not far away.

Saturday morning proved to be exceedingly memorable, for during

its course, most of the party ascended the famous Eiffel Tower (a few lost their courage on the ascent and stayed on lower platforms). The view from the top of the tower was a most exciting experience for those who reached it. The afternoon was spent in shopping in the

famous Paris shopping street—Rue de Rivoli.

On Sunday the party visited the Sacre Coeur Church. It stands on a noticeable little hill (clearly seen in the generally flat expanse of the city) in the famous Montmartre district. Wandering around the latter, the renowned picturesque artists' haunt, proved to be very interesting and worth while. The afternoon was spent in "The Cluny Museum," the only one of its kind in Europe. The major part of its contents was originally an exhibition at a Paris Festival, which was later put on permanent show in the present building. It is mainly of scientific interest, with massive demonstration laboratories in which intriguing experiments were shown to the party by a number of assistants. The extent of the building, and wide range of exhibits is so vast that to go round it properly would have taken much longer than the party had time to spare. The Astronomical Section and Test Room (where absorbing experiments may be tried by the public) proved to be of particular interest to the party. Some members of the party visited the "Rich Man's Playground"—the Champ Elysees, in the evening and and few went elsewhere in the city.

THE WELSH SOCIETY.

THE Society met twice and had one outing. The first meeting was on 16th October, 1959, when its chairman, Tudor Watkins, gave a humorous and enjoyable talk on his visit to the National Eisteddfod at Caernarfon. He had attended this as holder of a Breconshire

Education Committee Scholarship.

The second meeting was on 20th November, when Professor D. J. Davies, formerly of the Memorial College, Brecon, was presented with a book token in appreciation of his valuable services as a Governor of the School, and as Literary Adjudicator at the School Eisteddfod for many years. In the speeches delivered after a delicious tea, reference was made to his untiring work as Editor of "Brycheiniog." Best wishes were conveyed to him on his new appointment at Swansea.

On the morning of 9th July, 1959, a large party of boys from the Middle School set off in two saloon 'buses on a tour of famous Breconshire homes. The first stop was made at "Newton," birth place of Henry Vaughan (1621-1695), and the party then proceeded to the churchyard at Llansantffraed, where the Silurist was buried. The next stop was at Tretower. A Ministry of Works custodian conducted

the party around the old mansion of the Vaughan family, who played a prominent part in Breconshire history from the middle of the fifteenth century to the middle of the seventeenth century. We then proceeded up the beautiful Rhiangoll valley to Llanfihangel Cwm-du churchyard, where the Vicar, the Rev. R. M. Thomas, gave a very interesting talk at the grave of the great antiquarian and historian, Carnhuanawc (1757-1848). Because of an unavoidable delay at the beginning of the journey, our visit to Trefeca, home of Howel Harris, had to be postponed until a later date, so the 'buses sped on to Builth, where we had lunch. A short distance beyond this old and interesting market-town, the party made its next halt. There, at the foot of a fine granite monument, Dr. W. S. K. Thomas, our History Master, gave a most inspiring address on Llewelyn ap Gruffydd. The monument marks the place where the last native prince of Wales was killed in 1282. Arriving in the village of Llangamarch, we hurried to the churchyard there and stood in respectful silence at the grave of Theophilus Jones, the Historian of Brecknockshire (1759-1812). Here also lie the remains of Theophilus Evans, grandfather of the Historian and one of the most famous of Welsh prose writers. Thence in the direction of Cefn-brith, birth place of John Penry, the Puritan Martyr, who was executed in 1593. The twisting country road, however, proved too narrow for our forty-four seater 'buses, which became wedged between the tall hedges, about a mile from our destination. While Mr. Moses and Mr. Dewi Davies remained behind to give what assistance they could to the drivers, the boys, together with Mr. Harvey Williams and Dr. Thomas, proceeded on foot to Cefnbrith. In the yard of the famous old farm, Dr. Thomas gave a memorable address on John Penry. We then returned to the 'buses which were still trying to manoeuvre out of the narrow roadway by reversing into a small farmyard. After further difficulties the drivers finally succeeded in extricating their huge vehicles, and soon we were speeding home to Brecon. An eventful day, but a very happy one.




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
